

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

This increases the frictional force as f(F) = f(F). (1)


A similar analysis for the pull of the lawn mower shows that  $ffriction \ N \ (W \ F \sin )$  .

**Ans20.**For an incompressible non-viscous fluidthe sum of the pressure at any part plus the kinetic energy per unit volume plus the potential energy per unit volume there is always constant. (1.5)

The curved shape of an aerofoil causes a faster flow of air over its top surface than the lower one. From Bernoulli's principle, pressure of air below is greater than that above, and this produces the lift on the aerofoil.

(ii)To convert water at 100oc to steam at100oc the water needs to absorb the latent heat of vaporization. So it is more efficient to use steam rather than water because when steam at 100oc is circulated it releases latent heat in addition to heat released due to change in temperature.(2)



Hence, bob A of massm, after colliding with bob B of equal mass, will come to rest, while bob B will move with the velocity of bob A at the instant of collision.


